

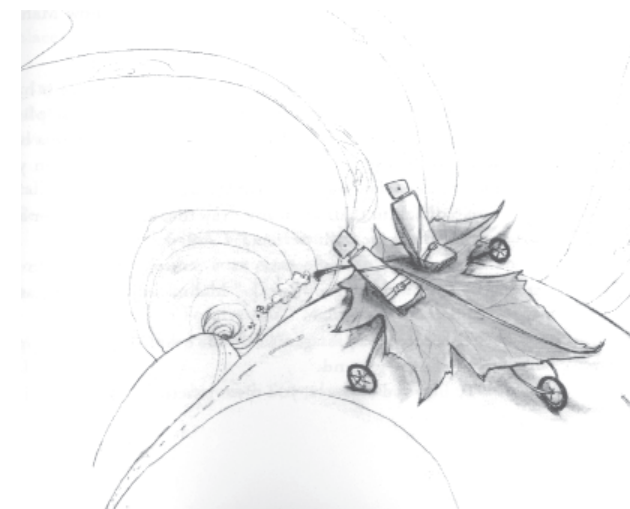
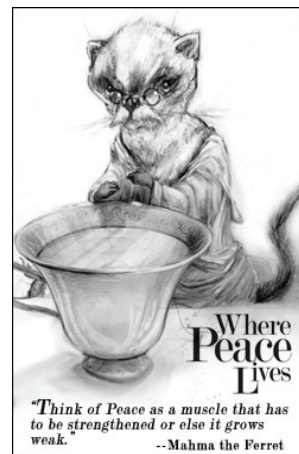
Where Peace Lives
